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
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Book Descriptions:

bsa commissioner basic training manual



Each manual module has several subtopics within the document. There is no provision for printing the information in book form. This format provides commissioners the opportunity to create their own hard copy book, or an ebook for tablet, phone or other digital device. This book provides extensive newunit resources for volunteers and professionals and covers the following topics Know the Market, Make the Call, Build the Team, and Grow It's available annually from Boys' Life magazine. They provide leadership for boards, committees, units, and finance. This book is designed to help key district leaders determine the number of people needed to operate an effective district, and then to locate, select, and recruit them. Alternatively, they may be used by a commissioner who does not have access to a computer, and a "commissioner friend" will enter the information. They may also be used when collaborating with a unit to complete the assessment of a unit's strengths and needs. Ideally, the unit should complete these within my.scouting.org when they are sent to them by the commissioner; however, they may be used as a worksheet prior to entry in my.scouting.org. Council commissioner training is being developed. Each course is about three hours in length and should be conducted by an instructor. 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The Acclimation modules include At the minimum, a Commissioner new to the BSA should take the first two modules and then complete the modules for the types of units they will be serving. These modules are all optional for those with Scouting experience. The student will still need to complete the onboarding worksheet with a mentor and the training must then be entered with the proper training code in Training Manager in order for the commissioner to be considered trained. Your training record will automatically be updated and you will be designated as "Trained" in Training Manager. It includes a short training topic at every monthly district and council commissioner meeting. Select topics are based on current learning needs. A session can be led by an appropriate commissioner, a professional, a member of a district or council committee, or even some talented person outside Scouting. After onboarding and being commissioned, commissioners should attend training the monthly district commissioner staff or Council Commissioner Cabinet meeting. Thus, every month commissioners are enhancing their knowledge of the program and how they can best serve units through continuous training. In addition to enhancing their knowledge at the monthly cabinet meetings, a commissioner should plan to attend an annual training event, which can be in the form of a commissioner conference or College of Commissioner Science or both. Nationally developed courses, resource materials, and training recognition provide the structure for good commissioner training. It is the local council's mission to provide fun, sparkle, motivation, and frequent training opportunities so that commissioners will learn good unit service skills. These training opportunities are led by a topflight very experienced faculty and feature tools, techniques, discussions and idea sharing that enhance the abilities of all commissioners. Roundtable Roundtable is a monthly program offered by districts that gives leaders handson experience and provides a forum for leaders to offer and receive help from their fellow Scouters. Scout Shop There are five Scout Shops in the area to get all of your Scouting supplies. Scouts with Special Needs The council is committed to making Scouting accessible and enjoyable to all Scouts, regardless of their abilities. Service Projects Uniform Exchange The uniform bank offers assistance to Scouts who would not otherwise be able to purchase a uniform. They coach and consult with adult leaders of packs, troops, crews and ships. The commissioners mission is to keep units operating at maximum efficiency, maintain regular contact with unit leaders, counsel leaders on where to find assistance, note weaknesses in programs, and suggest remedies. The commissioner is successful when units effectively deliver the ideals of Scouting to their members. Contact your district leadership or district commissioner to determine

the unit commissioner assigned to your unit. Commissioners should take Commissioner Fast Start training online. Basic training has been changed from one course for all commissioners to positionspecific courses for unit commissioners, assistant district commissioners, assistant commissioners and Roundtable commissioners. Find a commissioner training course near you.

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Commissioners are encouraged to attend the College of Commissioners Science, held the first Saturday in December. The objectives are to help commissioners expand their skills and unit service philosophy. The goal of this experience is to promote the increased effectiveness of the individual commissioner. Participants do not have to be a commissioner to attend. Any adult leader that is interested in the numerous resources available in the Scouting movement is invited to attend. The building opens at 7 am; lunch is included with registration. The tools are intended to help commissioners better perform not change current functions by improving efficiency and easy access of information. A collaborative effort between the unit's leaders, its chartered organization, the unit commissioner, and the district operating committee, it establishes a customized annual plan that is periodically reviewed and updated to provide continuing improvement. Done well, it is a powerful tool that can help leaders set goals, define accomplishments, encourage skill development, celebrate commitment and achievement, and inspire others to strive for similar success. Commissioners are experienced Scouters who help chartered organizations and unit leaders to achieve the aims of Scouting by using the methods of Scouting. They help to ensure that each unit has strong leadership and they encourage training, promote the use of the unit committee and encourage a relationship with the chartering organization. A first class council had a paid commissioner now known as a Scout executive or council executive, and could keep 15 cents of each 25 cent registration, while secondclass councils with volunteer commissioners could keep five cents. The position was reestablished in 1990, and is a fouryear term of service. Assistant council commissioners are appointed by the council commissioner with approval from the council.

The district commissioner is part of what is called the keythree, the other two members being the district chairman and the district executive. They act as a direct representative between the unit and the district. Unit commissioners are adult Scouters that have significant tenure within the Scouting program ten years experience is recommended, and are dedicated to seeing individual units succeed. In general, the unit commissioner uses several different tools to measure the success of his or her units. Unit commissioners encourage all of their units to earn the Quality Unit award on a yearly basis and usually visit each of their units at least once a month to make sure the unit is functioning within the aims and goals of the Boy Scouts of America. The unit commissioner is aware of district, council, and local civic and Scouting functions that can help supplement the units program. They also promote the monthly district roundtable within their assigned units and make sure that the unit leadership is current on training courses required by the National Council. Unit commissioners also are active in the community, assisting with the districts general membership goals for the year. Commissioners are expected to set the proper Scouting example, as they represent the district to the chartered organization and to the unit and its leaders, youth, and parents alike. Usually, a units charter with the Boy Scouts of America will be presented directly to the chartered organization at one of the chartered partners business meetings or social functions. Traditionally, a units official charter from the BSA is also presented annually to it by the unit commissioner. The roundtable is a forum for all of the unit leaders and provides opportunities for discourse and training. Each service area has a service area commissioner and each community has a community commissioner. Advanced and supplemental training is generally performed at a commissioners college provided at the local council level.

The BSA uses the laurel as a symbol for the service rendered to units and the continued partnership

between volunteers and professionals. The wreath of service is a feature on all commissioner and professional position patches. Primary commissioner Council Commissioner, District Commissioner, Unit Commissioner insignia bears a silver laurel wreath in accordance with the longstanding BSA award standard based on the U.S. military concept of silver being higher than gold. This award is available across several different program areas and can be earned more than once. In 1932 the award was opened up to other Scouters with the Scouters Training Award. The name reverted to Scouters Training Award in 1954. Those separate awards were discontinued in 2012 and the Scouters Training Award for Cub Scouting was restored. The square knot insignia is an embroidered green square knot on a cloth khaki patch. Multiple awards are denoted by the wear of program devices, worn on the square knot award and the ribbon of the award medal. They must have at least two years of tenure as a registered adult Cub Scout leader, complete This Is Scouting training, and complete basic training for their position.

They must attend a powwow, university of Scouting, or four roundtable meetings during each year of the tenure for this award. For basic position training, Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters need to complete the Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster Specific Training and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. These included participation in campouts, Friends of Scouting presentations, parents' nights or courts of honor, troop moneyearning projects, and council or district training events. The award was retired in 2013, when the roundtable and huddle staff positions were eliminated and replaced by assistant roundtable commissioners, who may earn the Arrowhead Honor instead. Roundtable Commissioners have special training to address roundtable needs, while Unit Commissioners receive training about visiting their units. It may also be helpful to a new Commissioner to take the Leader Specific training for Cub Scout Leaders, Boy Scout Leaders, or Venturing Leaders if you have not involved in that area of the Scouting Program, but are not required to become basic trained. In this threepart course, you will learn the fundamentals of the critical job of unit service. Part 1 Why Commissioners Topics covered include Aims and Methods of Scouting, the Commissioner Service Role, Supporting the Unit, and Unit Program Planning. Part 2 Units The Commissioners Greatest Priority Topics covered include Unit Committee Functions, Youth Protection, and Quality Unit Operation.
